

Source 1

According to the World Health Organization, transport is the fastest growing contributor to climate change. This includes the transportation of food over long distances.

There has been an increase in the international movement of food and this has raised concerns about carbon dioxide emissions associated with food transportation. In 2016 it was estimated that nearly 70 per cent of food eaten worldwide is imported from a different country.

Food grown in the United States on average travels 2000 km from source to point of sale. The average plate of food in the United States has travelled 2400 km before being eaten.

My family lives on a farm so I can explain the environmental problems from my experience. That is why I am a school representative at a local environmental committee. We are discussing how transporting anything, especially food, causes a problem.

Maybe the food in your house does not come from your local community and it has travelled a long way to your local supermarket. Don't forget that travelling in a car to the supermarket adds to the world's pollution from transport.

My father is a farmer and he thinks we should all eat food that has grown locally. He says that big supermarkets who buy food from other countries are not environmentally friendly and put local farmers out of business.

Well, I do not think you and your committee understand the situation at all. My father owns a supermarket and he has to offer people what they want. He needs to offer a good range of products to make a profit. Not all of these can be produced locally.

My father recently travelled to four different countries to check that the produce he sells is the best quality. He has just arranged for it to be transported by air so that it will get here more quickly and be fresher when it is sold in the supermarket. This will increase his profits.

Think about it my friend. If your farm uses fertilizers made with fossil fuels to help your crops grow, and a tractor which burns diesel, the food will be more damaging to the local area than food sent from a distant country.

My father's supermarket has started to deliver food to customers. This will be much better for the environment than everybody driving to their local food market.

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
