

#### Answer Question 1.

#### Research methods

1 Read Source A and then answer the questions below.

#### Source A

The British Social Attitudes (BSA) survey studies public opinion on social and political issues in Britain. The survey has been done each year since 1983. Researchers interview participants in their homes using a structured interview with 300 closed pre-coded questions. The questions in the survey ask about issues such as welfare benefits, health care, education, transport, the environment, immigration and crime.

Participants are selected for the survey using random sampling. The population of Britain is approximately 67 million people. The sample for the survey is 4000 adults who live in Britain.

A key aim of the BSA survey is to study changes in public opinion on social and political issues over time, so some questions are the same and repeated every year. Other questions in the survey are different every year.

The BSA survey collects quantitative data and produces statistics. These statistics make the survey useful for both government policy making and sociologists doing research.
