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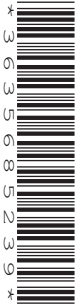

- 2 Read carefully the following extract from a novel set in an imaginary future. Most of the USA has become a religious dictatorship called Gilead. There are very limited rights for women. The narrator, Lydia, is explaining how she was forced to surrender to male domination.

How does the writer make this such a disturbing moment in her novel?

To help you answer this question, you might consider:

- the women's shocked responses at the start of the extract
- the arrival and attitudes of the armed men
- the reactions of Lydia and the other women to the developing situation.
