M: * Hello everyone, my name is Karl Smith, and today I'm going to talk to you about giraffes, fascinating animals that inhabit many parts of Africa. Giraffes can live anywhere between 20 and 25 years in the natural environment, and as many as 30 years under human care.

As you may already know, giraffes are herbivores, which means that their diet includes leaves, flowers, and fruits. Their preferred food is the leaves of acacia trees, which are high in nutrients, and their great height allows them to easily reach the leaves on the branches. It's not widely known that giraffes only need to drink water every few days, as they can get most of it from their diet.

What I really like about giraffes is that they are social animals. They live in groups which are known as towers. Each group is made up of females and their young, while males tend to live on their own and join groups only during certain parts of the year. It's very uncommon to see groups of older males together.

When I began researching giraffes and their behaviour as a young student, I didn't realise that these amazing animals can produce such a wide range of sounds. So it was great to learn that they make very specific sounds to express fear, to communicate with their young, and even to express that they are annoyed with another giraffe!

Giraffes are generally peaceful animals and like to avoid conflict whenever possible. When threatened, they would rather run away, but if they are left with no other choice, they will use their powerful legs to kick predators. It's very rare for giraffes to bite, though this behaviour has been observed.

Now, let's talk about giraffes' sleeping habits. As babies, they lie down with their legs folded beneath their bodies and rest their heads on their backs. Adults, however, usually sleep standing up. In places such as Africa, giraffes are never far from danger, so this position allows them to start moving again, and a fit giraffe can run very fast indeed!

A lot of research has been carried out into giraffes' necks of course due to their strength and flexibility. What I have always been interested in is their feet, which prevent giraffes from sinking into sand despite their great weight. Their tongues also attract a lot of attention due to their unusual colour.

There's lots more that I could tell you about how giraffes live, but as we're approaching the end of the talk, I'd like to recommend that you visit a display of photos taken by one of my colleagues. It's been open for just over a week now and people who've seen it left some positive feedback on the website, so it's not just my personal opinion! **

M: * Good afternoon! Today I'm talking to Eve Robson, a professional dressmaker. Eve, can you first tell us a bit about your background in dressmaking?

F: Good afternoon! I've been a dressmaker for over 15 years. I took up sewing when I was a teenager and had to research every step myself as none of my relatives had any skills in this area! But I loved it, and eventually did fashion design at university, which was an amazing experience!

M: That's impressive! What would you say is the most important ability when it comes to dressmaking?

F: Well, it depends on your area of work. If you work for a large organisation, it's probably being able to closely follow the design patterns, so your work is identical to others'. I work with individual clients, so I'd say it's my ability to gain their trust and for them to like me is what really counts. And a certain level of creativity is always a bonus, I guess.

M: So how do you make sure your work meets your clients' needs?

F: Previous experience has taught me that clients often really struggle to explain what they have in mind in terms of designs they like. So instead, I suggest that they find several pictures of outfits that appeal to them and bring them to our first appointment. I then help them identify the design that suits their body type, which is the key to their overall satisfaction.

M: The dressmaking industry is competitive. How do you make sure your skills are current?

F: I'm quite busy so while there are plenty of conferences organised in the UK and internationally, I often don't have the time or the energy to attend. Having spent many years working as a dressmaker, I think the value of attending workshops is a bit limited, and they can be pricey. But I share my workspace with some very talented colleagues, who've been a huge source of inspiration to me.

M: Tell us the process of making a dress from start to finish.

F: Sure! After meeting with the client, I draw the final design. Creating the pattern and cutting the material to size are the jobs I do whenever I have time. I then have the elements sewn together by my team, before adding any decorative elements or finishing touches. I also meet the client to ensure the dress fits perfectly, by making any necessary adjustments.

M: Tell me about the most demanding client you've ever had ...

F: Oh dear ... I think it was an opera singer! She was quite stubborn and totally convinced she understood dressmaking better than I did! And she just couldn't settle on anything – she liked something one day and hated it another. It took us several meetings to finalise the design before I could start the work.

M: So, what advice would you give to someone who wants to pursue a career in dressmaking?

F: Well, one idea would be to watch online videos as they often show the latest fashion trends, though personally I can't overestimate the importance of trying a wide variety of dressmaking jobs. Having your designs shown during fashion events would be desirable but isn't strictly necessary in the early stages.

M: That's great advice. So before we finish, tell our listeners about your next professional challenge.

F: Actually, I'm meeting my consultant later this week to discuss how we can strengthen the brand's presence to reach a wider audience. Because I've recently expanded the team that works for me, I need to ensure there's enough work coming in to keep them all in their jobs, as the contract we've had with a theatre company located in my city is about to come to an end.
