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General information about practical exams

Centres must follow the guidance on science practical exams given in the Cambridge Handbook.

Safety

Supervisors must follow national and local regulations relating to safety and first aid.

Only those procedures described in the question paper should be attempted.

Supervisors must inform candidates that materials and apparatus used in the exam should be treated with caution. Suitable eye protection should be used where necessary.

Before the exam

- The packets containing the question papers must **not** be opened before the exam.
- It is assumed that standard school laboratory facilities, as indicated in the *Guide to Planning Practical Science*, will be available.
- Spare materials and apparatus for the tasks set must be available for candidates, if required.

During the exam

- It must be made clear to candidates at the start of the exam that they may request spare materials and apparatus for the tasks set.
- Where specified, the supervisor **must** perform the experiments and record the results as instructed. This must be done **out of sight** of the candidates, using the same materials and apparatus as the candidates.
- Any assistance provided to candidates must be recorded in the supervisor's report.
- If any materials or apparatus need to be replaced, for example, in the event of breakage or loss, this must be recorded in the supervisor's report.

After the exam

- The supervisor must complete a report for each practical session held and each laboratory used.
 - Each packet of scripts returned to Cambridge International must contain the following items:
 - the scripts of the candidates specified on the bar code label provided
 - the supervisor's results relevant to these candidates
 - the supervisor's reports relevant to these candidates
 - seating plans for each practical session, referring to each candidate by candidate number
 - the attendance register.

Specific information for this practical exam

The supervisor must be a teacher of physics or other competent physicist who is familiar with the requirements of this syllabus. During the exam, the supervisor (**not** the invigilator) should obtain a sample set of numerical results by following the relevant steps in the question paper. The results should be clearly labelled 'supervisor's results' and recorded on the supervisor's report or on a spare copy of the question paper.

Organisation of the exam

- The number of sets of apparatus provided for each experiment should be $\frac{1}{2}N$, where N is the number of candidates taking the exam.
- Candidates must **not** be provided with any additional apparatus beyond that specified in these instructions.
- Candidates should be allowed access to the apparatus for each experiment for one hour only.
- After spending one hour on one experiment, candidates should change over to the other experiment.
- The order in which a candidate attempts the two experiments is immaterial.

Assistance to candidates

- Candidates should be informed that, if they find themselves in real difficulty, they may ask the supervisor for practical assistance, but that the extent of this assistance will be reported to the examiner, who may not award full credit for the relevant skills.
- Assistance should only be given when it is asked for by a candidate or where apparatus is seen to have developed a fault.
- Assistance should be restricted to enabling candidates to make observations and measurements. Observations and measurements must **not** be made for candidates, and no help should be given with data analysis or evaluation.
- In cases of faulty apparatus that prevent the required measurements from being taken, the supervisor should allow extra time to give the candidate a fair opportunity to perform the experiment as if the fault had not been present.
- Any assistance or extra time given to candidates must be recorded in the supervisor's report.

Materials and apparatus for Question 1 (per set of apparatus unless otherwise specified)

- 3V d.c. power supply (e.g. two 1.5V dry cells) with terminals.
- Digital voltmeter set to the range 0–20V reading to the nearest 0.01V or better. If a digital multimeter is used, the range should be fixed and any unused terminals should be covered.
- 210 cm length of 30 swg (0.315 mm diameter) nichrome wire. See Note 1 and Note 2.
- Wooden strip of length 95.0 cm and approximate cross-section 2 cm × 1 cm. See Note 1.
- Nail of approximate length 2 cm. See Note 1.
- Metre rule with a millimetre scale.
- Seven connecting leads.
- 22Ω resistor in a component holder labelled 22Ω . See Note 3.
- Two crocodile clips. See Note 4.
- Small container for the crocodile clips.
- Switch.
- Micrometer screw gauge (shared between at most three candidates).

Notes




Fig. 1.1 (not to scale)

1 The nail should be hammered centrally into the wooden strip at a distance of 1.0 cm from the end. The nail should not protrude through the lower surface, as shown in Fig. 1.1.




Fig. 1.2 (not to scale)

The wire should be securely attached to the nail and wrapped around the wooden strip. The wire should be secured with tape along the entire lower surface of the strip and around the strip as shown in Fig. 1.2.

- 2 If this wire is not available, other resistance wire of approximate resistance $15\Omega m^{-1}$ may be used. Details of the wire used must be recorded in the supervisor's report.
- **3** The resistor should have a maximum tolerance of 5% and a minimum power rating of 0.25W, e.g. RS Components stock number 386-666.
- 4 The jaws of the crocodile clips should be cleaned so that they make a good electrical contact with the resistance wire.
- 5 The apparatus should be laid out on the bench. If the apparatus is to be used by another candidate, then it should be dismantled and restored to its original state.

Materials and apparatus for Question 2 (per set of apparatus unless otherwise specified)

- Stand.
- Clamp.
- Boss.
- 100 g mass hanger.
- 100 g slotted mass.
- Paper clip of approximate length 5 cm.
- 250 cm³ cooking oil in a 250 cm³ beaker.
- Four M12 steel nuts, e.g. RS Components stock number 530-078.
- Four M16 steel nuts, e.g. RS Components stock number 275-670.
- Two small containers for the nuts, lined with paper towels.
- Two paper towels.
- Stop-watch reading to 0.1 s or better.
- Two expendable springs each with approximate outside diameter 15 mm, approximate coiled length 20 mm and approximate spring constant 25 Nm⁻¹ (e.g. Philip Harris product code B8G87194). See Note 1.
- 30 cm ruler with a millimetre scale.
- Access to a balance reading to 0.1 g or better (shared between at most four candidates).

Notes

1 The two springs should be looped together, as shown in Fig. 2.1.



2 The apparatus should be laid out on the bench. If the apparatus is to be used by another candidate, then it should be restored to its original state. The nuts, paper clip and paper towels should be replaced.
