Answer Question 1.

1 Some sociologists believe that their personal values should influence the choices they make about what to study and how to carry out their research. One reason that they hold this view is because they believe that the purpose of sociology is to be a force for good and that its findings should be used to help solve *social problems*. In other words, they believe the research conducted by sociologists should be used to improve society.

Positivists view the nature of research differently. They believe that the values of the sociologist should not influence the research process. Furthermore, they focus their research on sociological problems rather than social problems. Their concern is simply to uncover truths about the social world and not to change society. Positivists have less interest in how their research may be used by policy makers. However, their research may still be affected by how it is funded.

(b)	Describe two ways that research might be affected by how it is funded.	[4]

- (c) Explain how the values of the sociologist may influence the research process. [8]
- (d) Assess the view that the aim of sociological research should be to improve society. [11]
